Best time to travel to Edinburgh

Edinburgh can be visited at all times of the year. However the weather can be considerably cold in the winter months, with an average low of 1 ° C.

Recommended stay – 2 nights Best season

The best season to travel to Edinburgh is during the spring and summer as the temperatures warm, with temperatures averaging between $6 - 12\,^\circ$ C, although the spring may incur some rainfall. The summer months (June - August) tend to be warmer and drier than the rest of the year, with highs of 20 $^\circ$ C. During the summer months, the festivals, consisting of comedy, art and films, take place

We recommend you visit

- Visit Edinburgh Castle, symbol of the Scottish nation and home to the Honours of Scotland and the oldest set of Crown Jewels in Europe. Within this is St Margaret's Chapel, which is the oldest building in the city
- Take a walk down the Royal Mile, stretching through the Old Town, where you find exclusive restaurants, shops and authentic pubs
- Visit St Giles' Cathedral (dating back to the 15th Century) where the towering crown-like peak is a dominant feature of Edinburgh's Royal Mile. Traditionally called the High Kirk of Edinburgh, the cathedral is named after the patron saint
- of cripples and beggars.
- Holyrood Palace the Queen's official residence in Scotland. When no member of the royal family is staying you can tour the staterooms and visit the historic apartments in which Mary, Queen of Scots once resided
- Enjoy an exclusive private dining experience on The Royal Yacht Britannia, the former official yacht of Queen Elizabeth II.
- Edinburgh offers some wonderful shopping areas. Princes Street and George Street form the boundaries of the main shopping areas in the city centre.

Possible activities to include:

1. Private Ghost Tour & Vault Entry in the city's Old Town

By day Edinburgh is a bustling metropolis – but at night the old buildings and narrow closes take on a more sinister air. A long history of murder, torture, hangings and plague has left a haunting legacy on the city's Old Town and ghostly apparitions now walk its streets.

Enter the underground vaults, whose walls, are said to have absorbed the memories of those who once lived and worked there. Finish the tour with a drop of whisky to calm the nerves in an underground cellar.

2. Edinburgh Castle Private Tour

Enjoy exclusive access to explore the highlights of Edinburgh Castle before the doors open to the general public. 8. Day experience visiting St Andrews & Loch Lomond

Visit the town of St Andrews, home to Scotland's oldest university. Spend time exploring the quaint streets and browse through the charming stores. Afterwards, visit the ruins of the castle and the cathedral; St Andrew is the patron saint of Scotland and, significantly, the cathedral was the largest in Scotland before being destroyed during the Reformation.

Later today, explore St Andrews further from a culinary perspective. Learn about the rich history of the town whilst enjoying gastronomic treats along the way. During the tour, you have the opportunity to taste local specialities, wine, whisky and crafted beer. With any remaining time this afternoon, explore the East Neuk of Fife, where some quaint traditional fishing villages in Scotland are located. Crail, in particular, is considered by many to be one of the most picturesque villages in Britain.
